Nicaragua



46 students from the Jo Richardson Community School aged 14 - 18 spent the last 18 months fundraising and preparing their fitness for an exciting True Adventure expedition to Nicaragua on 7th July 2016.

The students faced many challenges on the 16-night expedition. On arriving in Managua the young people had to source and book their own accommodation, food and transport for their 16 day gruelling expedition. The students spent their first nights after landing travelling to Leon and Granada embracing the culture and atmosphere of these vibrant cities. The group then split into three teams for their community project and arduous trekking of four active volcanos. The teams embarked on challenging project work for the charity La Esperanza on Omtepe Island and in Granada, working with children in local schools, teaching, building and painting and building paths and drainage ditches. This work was back breaking in 38-degree heat and 85% humidity. Britney-Lea Ogbebor 16 said "The conditions are hard but I feel amazing making a difference in this school, making it a better and safer place for the local children".

The teams were challenged emotionally, mentally and physically, working with children in some of the poorest areas of the country. This was followed with several days of trekking to four of the countries many active volcanos. "We saw some incredible sunsets and sunrises with the most amazing views. I have learnt to push myself beyond my physical limits on this expedition and I am really proud of what I've done" - Bobby Edmead aged 14.



The students were encouraged to fully immerse themselves in local life, at times living within the immediate community which challenged their ability to communicate in this predominantly Spanish speaking country.

The final two days were spent relaxing on the coast in San Juan Del Sur where there was much reflection about the trip and what the young people had achieved in their time in Nicaragua. Emily Vincent aged 17 – "This has given me a desire to travel more and although it has been physically tough I have loved every minute. Making new friends which will last a life time".

Teacher and leader of this expedition Ms Boller said "We have been running world expeditions at JRCS for 10 years now and we have taken over 150 students to places such as Kenya, Malaysia and Nicaragua. We often find that passions are kindled and life missions unearthed through taking young people out of their comfort zone. I am so proud of the staff, who give up their time and the students who will remember the sights, sounds and faces for many years to come.

JRCS Results 2016



I am delighted to announce that JRCS achieved its best ever results at Key Stage 4 this year!

Nearly 65% of our Year 11 students achieved the government benchmark of an $A^* - C$ in English and Maths. Over 20% of all our GCSE entries were either an A^* or A grade, these two results mean that we can celebrate the best ever KS4 results in the history of JRCS.

At Sixth Form we consolidated on our success from the past few years and increased the number of our students attaining the top grades and going to top universities.

I want to take this opportunity to congratulate all of our students who received successful examination results this Summer. I also want to thank all my staff who have worked so hard over the past year to make sure that these students have the support, care and guidance that was necessary to ensure their success.



Year 7 – 'The Island' day

On Tuesday 6th September, our new Year 7s had their first day at Jo Richardson based on a fictional Island. The students took part in a number of sessions across a range of departments, from building a communications tower in Maths to transporting a secret code across the Island in Dance. The day was focused around three core principles which made up our whole school numeracy programme 'Go Figure'; problem solving, reasoning and decision making. The students were fantastic and their contributions and discussions were really impressive.

Megan McCabe, 7F, has kindly shared her experience of the day:

"We had to build a 'communication tower' to track satellite signals, the higher the better. It had to be constructed out of spaghetti strands (hard but easy to snap) which acted as beams and also marshmallows (easy to puncture, good for support) which acted as a corner support. The challenge was to see how high we could build it and also how cheap. I have learned that working in a group is a great learning experience as well as a fun bonding experience – overall it was a real success. The difficulties were making our tower stable, which was a problem for most groups but with strategical thinking we managed to overcome it. Although there were a few minor challenges in this lesson, our group did rather well as the lesson went well thanks to the help of the teachers"

Investment Banking – A career for the future

We were lucky enough to have a visiting speaker from the Worshipful Company of International Bankers, Michael Llewelyn-Jones, who delived a presentation last week. Michael has just completed his year as "Master" and prior to this was Chairman and Managing Director of Citibank. He has a wealth of experience



within the industry having also been an Account Manager for Citibank looking after clients such as Shell.

Michael came in to speak to Sixth Form students, plus a couple of invited KS4 students, about what Investment banking is, its history and the way it works. He also briefly covered the variety of jobs that can be researched in the banking sector as a whole. During his talk, he explained about how investment bankers work mainly on mergers and acquisitions, Capital Markets or Foreign Exchange Markets. He outlined the difficulties that there have been with the industry and showed

how world events affect their revenue and outcomes. Michael explained the various routes into the sector and gave some top tips about the degree programmes that would help students in their quest for a position (captivating their attention with a starting salary example!). Michael spent quite a lot of time after his actual talk, speaking 1:1 with students answering a whole range of questions.

Jay Batchelor, Year 13, attended the talk and wrote: "I thought that the speaker was very interesting and engaging. It gave me a real insight into what investment banking is actually about and how it works. It helped to give me a better understanding of what I want to do after university and how to do it."


We are very grateful to Michael for giving up his time to come and spend time with JRCS students. We look forward to more outside speakers offering their insight to different sectors of work as the year progresses.

Year 12 A level PE Biomechanics trip to UEL

The Year 12 A level PE cohort visited UEL Stratford campus on Tuesday 22nd November, to meet a Biomechanist and participate in biomechanical analysis. The 10 students have been studying force and its effects on sports performance as well as looking at new technologies being used to analyse movement efficiency and sporting technique. The students had an opportunity to try out the force plates in the lab to see the effects of force on motion and used a dynamometer to test muscular strength in the legs, which was important to evaluate training programmes and recovery from injury. We learnt about limb kinematics and looked at the technology used to study human movement before finally discussing the possible career paths following a degree in Sports Science. 


We are so proud of their work and that they are representing this project which will be taught to thousands of students in Essex and Barking and Dagenham.


Student of the month – MATHS

JRCS Debates in the House of Lords

The debate was chaired by the Speaker of the House, Lord Faulkner and the rules and protocols of Parliament were followed.
