

Digging Deeper:

In the UK, we hold Remembrance Sunday each year on the Sunday that falls closest to 11th November: the day WW1 ended. This day was originally used to remember soldiers who died in WW1, but it has since broadened and is now an opportunity for us to pay our respects to everybody who has lost their lives due to conflict, including soldiers from other wars, civilians and victims of terror attacks. 40 million poppies are distributed each year to mark Remembrance Day. The story of why we wear poppies dates back to 1915, when Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae lost his friend in the battle of Ypres. As he was grieving the loss of his friend, he spotted lots of poppies growing in the battle fields. This poignant sight inspired him to write one of the most famous war poems of all time: In Flanders Fields.
