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# **HEADTEACHER'S NEWS**

### Coronavirus

As you will be aware, the situation regarding the Coronavirus is changing on a daily basis. Following the government's announcement yesterday it appears that there are no immediate plans to close schools as part of the delay phase. However, we need to be prepared for any changes to these plans at very short notice.

In relation to the precautions that we are taking in school, we are working hard to ensure that all our students understand the importance of washing their hands thoroughly and regularly during the school day. We have installed new hand sanitisers and are making sure that the appropriate washing facilities are available to students at all times.

Following the government's advice if your son or daughter either develops a new and 'continuous cough' or high temperature, they

should be kept off school and if these symptoms persist they should self-isolate for a period of seven days. Please make sure that you refer to NHS guidelines and contact your doctor should you require any further information.

Also following government advice, we have sadly cancelled our Year 13 trip to Berlin which was due to go out on Thursday and our Easter Ski trip to Italy.

We have a number of planned trips over the coming weeks and months and, at the current time, these are all going ahead. However, a decision will be made in relation to each one individually closer to the date of departure and taking into account the government's advice and guidance.

We will be communicating with you via text, email and with regular updates on the school website. If you think we do not have your most up to date mobile phone number or

email address, please contact the School Office immediately. In the event of a closure or the need to send students home, our aim is to give you as much advance warning as possible.

As I have said previously, the situation changes on a daily basis and I will keep you updated as information comes to us. Please do not hesitate to contact me at the school if you have any questions or queries.


Georgina who used to come to this school, she did the same event as me'.

# My trip to Parliament:

Apologies for the short hiatus, but without further ado, let's continue.



# **Tuesday 5th February**

The Year 12 Politics class and I took a trip down to Westminster to pay Parliament a little visit. Security there was extremely tight, having to drink any liquid to prevent poisonings as you "wouldn't drink the untestable". I even had to go through without my belt! However, it was all not in vain as this year we got to sit on the seats of the Supreme Court Judges (just to rub it in the faces of the Year 13s as they never got such an opportunity), the same place where they ruled the prorogation of Parliament unlawful. Now that was an experience which seemed almost impossible to reach, the fact that we can visit places of extreme importance like the Supreme Court or Parliament, but I guess that's what it means to live in a democracy.

After dilly-dallying in the SC, we took a little detour to No.10 Downing Street, just before the actual visit to Parliament, to see if we could catch a glimpse of our busy Prime Minister, but being in an enclosed area, we couldn't see anything.

The security process of Parliament was very much the same as for the Supreme Court going through the metal detectors and the rest of it. But the tour of Parliament was really fascinating. One of the highlights was going to watch a small debate in the House of Commons where we got to see David Davis, a Conservative Party politician who served as Secretary of State for Exiting the European Union from July 2016 to July 2018. We also saw Richard Burgon, Labour MP and Tim Farron, former leader of Lib Dems. Also present were newly inaugurated MPs of constituencies like Keighley's new MP Robert Moore following the 2019 general election.

After the tour, we had a little fun and games in a workshop hosted by the staff of Parliament for educational purposes. In this workshop, we were looking at elections and different types of election voting methods and the pros and cons of each as well as what type of government may be formed as a result of these methods. The class was split into teams to demonstrate but also to act in a point system of a game, which my team won of course.

To end it all, we had to say goodbye to our Parliament friends and make our way back home. Everyone was exhausted, but it is undeniable that the trip was very fruitful and educational. I am sure that the Year 12s found the trip insightful and it proved very useful to consolidate my knowledge in politics for my own exams.

# **Psychology Trip**



On Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> March, the Psychology Department and Year 12 Psychology students visited London Zoo to take part in a phobias workshop. 
# **Resilience Poster Competition**




# Cycling to School

At Jo Richardson Community School we encourage students to improve their health and well-being by cycling to school, offering safe places within the school grounds to securely lock their bikes. To promote the health and well-being of all students we want to ensure that student cyclists follow some simple guidelines written below. This is in response to concerns raised by members of the local community, staff and students who walk outside of our school.

# Guidelines for cycling whilst attending Jo Richardson Community School

- 1. Students must register their bike with their Head of Year by collecting a letter from their form tutor and having the reply slip signed by them and their parent/carer.
- 2. Students not to ride their bike whilst inside the school grounds.
- 3. Students to lock their bike inside the school grounds.
- 4. Students not to ride their bikes in the area directly outside of school.
- 5. These areas are indicated in red as a 'no cycle zone'. Students to push their bike over one of the zebra crossings on Gale Street or Goresbrook Road before being able to cycle.



## The guidelines will apply to our students at all times.

Students failing to comply with the simple guidelines should expect to receive the following tiered response.

1st Offence – 1 hour HOY detention and banned from bringing their bike for one week.

2<sup>nd</sup> Offence – 2 hour SLT detention and banned from binging their bike for a half term.

3<sup>rd</sup> Offence – Student placed in LSU and banned from bring their bike for the rest of the year.

N.B. Further offences would be dealt with accordingly.

We thank you for your support with the simple measures above to address the safety of students and the positive reputation of the school.
