#### **► HEADTEACHER'S NEWS**

Safety on the way to and from school

I wrote to parents/carers before the holiday, and you would have also received a letter from the local authority about ensuring you know where your child is at the end of the school day. Can I ask parents/carers to talk to their child about going straight home at the end of the school day if they are not involved in extracurricular clubs or activities in school. Students should not be hanging around at the shops near Becontree station or in the local parks in uniform. Unfortunately, there has been an increase in muggings and and knife crime in the local area. If your child is the victim of a mugging, please report it to the police. We are working with the Safer Neighbourhood Teams and the police to ensure there is an increased police presence in the local area. When we can, senior staff continue to be on duty outside the school and at the shops. If we see students hanging around, they will be asked to go straight home. It is important that parents/carers support us with this in order that we can keep students safe.

#### Cyber attack

I wrote to you over the half-term holiday to explain that the school had been the victim of a cyber attack. I would like to reassure parents that we have done all that we can to protect their data. The attack mainly affected our admin drive and did not affect our main student database or ParentPay. We were able to rebuild our network over the half-term break so that we were able to continue to provide high quality lessons and education to all our students. We have been working with the police and all relevant agencies following the attack. May I thank parents/carers for their support

during this difficult time. I can confirm that the phone lines are now working again.

## Year 12 get Creatively Mentored in the Jungle

Seven Year 12 students have seized an outstanding opportunity to get mentored by employees of Jungle Creations – a social media first publisher.

The company specialises in building and promoting brands. The opportunity is sourced via Heena at Peer 2 Peer with Dionne at Jungle Creations.

Students had to apply to gain the mentee ship, attend an online interview and on Tuesday this week went in person to the company office and met their mentor.

The group listened to Heena outline the programme, expectations of the students and what she hoped they would get out of the time. Dionne explained about the company and introduced each of the mentors and got them to explain to the students the role they have at the company and how it works. This identified the wide range of opportunities that are present in this career area.

After a few ice breakers the students were paired with their mentors. This had been decided based upon the application form and interview in order to make the partnership as helpful as possible.

Just before the group broke away, the CEO of Jungle Creations, Melissa Chapman, came and introduced herself – showing how the company is really behind the scheme. Mentor and mentee then had about 50 minutes together getting to know each other, outlining what they want to achieve and having preliminary discussions in some cases about what their presentation might be for the competition at the end! By the end, all had planned for their next week's session.

The programme is a 10-week programme; at the end of it one of the students will also be lucky enough to get a two-week paid work placement in the firm.

Having been at the launch on Tuesday and spoken with Heena & Dionne I have no doubt that JRCS students will gain enormously from this experience, not only benefiting during the 10 weeks, but also in their ability to take new skills and confidence into their careers and futures.


They had an opportunity to meet the project manager who described the career possibilities in construction and talked through the massive 2.2bn regeneration project that is taking shape at the site.

### What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

# INFLUENCERS

In today's digital age, social media influencers play an increasingly significant role in shaping the opinions, interests and behaviours of our children. While many of these individuals can have a positive effect, influencer culture can also present certain risks – such as encouraging consumerism, affecting self-esteem and blurring trustworthiness. To help ensure a safe online environment for young people, it's vital to maintain open communication, set sensible boundaries, promote a healthy self-image and teach digital media literacy. Our guide delives deeper into all of these.

#### WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

#### HEIGHTENED CONSUMERISM

A major way that influences make money is through brand partnerships and sponsored content. As a result, children who follow them may be exposed to a steady stream of advertising: this con lead to materialistic attitudes, unrealistic expectations and an increased desire to have the latest products. Many influences have built huge brand empires around their large, impressionable following.

#### THE SOFT SELL

Some influencers cren't always transporent about the motivations behind their posts, bluring the lines between genuine recommendations and poid-for promotions – and young people sometimes find it difficult to distinguish authentic content from advertising. Many major social platforms have taken steps to make aponsored content and ads easier to identify, but it remains an area of concern.

#### PRIVACY CONCERNS

Inspired by their favourity influences, children may start sharing more of their own lives on line — which sould reveal personal information or details about their doily routine. This openness can put them at risk of cyberbullying or even predatory behaviour. This is exacerbated by live streaming, which gives young people no time to consider the potential consequences of saying too much

#### UNDERMINING SELE-ESTEEM



Many influencers share images and videos of themselves and their activities, which are often poinstakingly curated and edited to present an idealised version of their Ife. Children who follow these influencers may develop distorted expertations about body image and the concept of beauty, which can potentially lead to negative self-esteem and even mental health issues.

# Q A

### Advice for Parents & Carers

#### KEEP TALKING

Chat to your child about the content they consume an social media and the influencers that they like. Encourage them to think critically about what they see and hear online, and listen to any concerns they might have. Maintaining this line of open, honest communication can help your child to make informed decisions about which individuals they follow and what content they engage with.

#### SET SOME BOUNDARIES

Agree age-appropriate boundaries for your child's social media use, including time limits and privacy settings (the two major operating systems on mobile devices, Android and IOS, have these controls baked in). Try to keep an eye on your child's online activity and discuss it regularly with them — including reminding them of the potential risks that can arise from following influences.

#### SUPPORT A HEALTHY SELF-IMAGE

Reinforce your child's awareness that real life isn't usually as picture perfect as it may appear on social media — and how some content (particularly that of influencers) is aften curated, staged or edited to look more glamorous. If possible, highlight examples of other influencers who share authentic, relatable material which acknowledges their imperfections and struggles as well:

#### PROMOTE MEDIA LITERACY

Talk to your child about the concepts of sponsored content, advertising and potential influencer bias. Teach them to critically evaluate the information they're presented with online and to consider the possible reasons behind content creation. This can help young people develop the skills to make healthier decisions about the influencers they choose to follow and the content they consume.


