Year 12 Psychology Egg Baby Project



This half term, Year 12 Psychology students have been studying attachment: an emotional bond between two people, leading to certain behaviours such as proximity-seeking and serving the function of protecting an infant.

The psychology department decided that the best way to help the students understand this

was by giving them something just as delicate as a newborn baby: an egg. Using the principles

and theories of attachment, the students had to take care of egg babies for a week, and this included taking their babies everywhere with them all while keeping them alive.

They had to write up baby journals throughout the process and some students did that by creating diaries, documents, and even TikTok accounts. We found that there were genuine attachments formed between an egg baby and its caregiver, leading to heartbreaking situations when some eggs were lost during the week, and tearjerking moments when the project was finally over.

There are also plans underway for one of the students to be on set for the full day Friday next week to shadow a production/ direction team and to have some time to speak with media creators about the process before the shoot occurs.

All the partnerships are now also focusing on their final projects and presentations at the end of the 10 week programme – for one of them it will lead to a paid internship – but all of them are winners in the experience they are getting.

The students are all feeding back that the contact, networking they are getting is exciting and so much more than if they were not on the scheme.

Seven Year 12 students have seized an outstanding opportunity to get mentored by employees of Jungle Creations – a social media first publisher.

The company specialises in building and promoting brands. The opportunity is sourced via Heena at Peer 2 Peer with Dionne at Jungle Creations.

Students had to apply to gain the mentee ship, attend an online interview and on Tuesday this week went in person to the company office and met their mentor.

The group listened to Heena outline the programme, expectations of the students and what she hoped they would get out of the time. Dionne explained about the company and introduced each of the mentors and got them to explain to the students the role they have at the company and how it works. This identified the wide range of opportunities that are present in this career area.

After a few ice breakers the students were paired with their mentors. This had been decided based upon the application form and interview in order to make the partnership as helpful as possible.

Just before the group broke away, the CEO of Jungle Creations, Melissa Chapman, came and introduced herself – showing how the company is really behind the scheme. Mentor and mentee then had about 50 minutes together getting to know each other, outlining what they want to achieve and having preliminary discussions in some cases about what their presentation might be for the competition at the end! By the end, all had planned for their next week's session.

The programme is a 10-week programme; at the end of it one of the students will also be lucky enough to get a two-week paid work placement in the firm.

Having been at the launch on Tuesday and spoken with Heena & Dionne I have no doubt that JRCS students will gain enormously from this experience, not only benefiting during the 10 weeks, but also in their ability to take new skills and confidence into their careers and futures.
