HEADTEACHER'S NEWS

We have had a positive start to the year and I would like to thank all parents/carers for their continued support.

Next week, students will be participating in our ACHIEVE trips. Students' feedback about these days is always positive and we hope your child finds them valuable and enjoyable. We will have different start and finish times for different year groups, so please ensure your child knows what time they are expected in school and what they need to bring. It was great to see so many of you at our welcome evenings and I hope you found the evenings informative. During these events we spoke about the importance of homework. Please continue to support us by checking your child has completed their homework. If a child is having trouble with their SENECA password, please ask them to speak to Mrs Morris so that we can support them. Homework is important in ensuring our students develop good study habits that will ensure they are ready to meet the challenges of exams in Year 11 and Sixth Form. We will be holding the Year 7 Information Evening after Christmas so that we can explain your child's first report card.

Uniform

As the weather turns colder, please ensure your child has a school jumper. A reminder that

students are not permitted to wear hoodies or tracksuit tops and should have a proper coat for the journey to and from school. We have a selection of preloved uniform items that are free and available for students that need them which can be found in the school reception. If you have any uniform you have outgrown, then any donations would be welcome! We also have a large amount of lost property. If your child has lost an item, it would be worth checking for it in the lost property baskets in reception.

I am pleased to say that standards of uniform have improved this half term. We will be continuing to monitor uniform next half term. Skirts should be worn to the knee, trousers should be tailored trousers that should be worn around the waist. Students should wear school shoes and not trainers. Uniform promotes equality, reduces distractions, and fosters a sense of belonging and pride in the school community. It also helps reinforce discipline and a positive school identity. Students represent us on the journey to and from school so it is important that students look smart and behave appropriately. I am extremely proud of our students, and I want them to support me in projecting a positive image of themselves and the school in the local community.

KEEPING YOU AND YOUR PHONE SAFE

Getting a phone is really exciting. You can stay in touch with friends and find out more about the world.

YOU CAN HELP US PROTECT AND TRACK YOUR PHONE IF IT'S STOLEN.

HERE'S 3 THINGS YOU CAN DO:

 Your phone will have security features such as a passcode or fingerprint/ face ID. Make sure you use it to protect access to your phone.

- Tracker apps can help locate your phone if it's lost or stolen. Ask a parent to show you how to set one up.
- Record the phone's IMEI number in a separate place at home. Find this by typing in "#06#. You'll need to give this number to police if it's stolen.

5 TIPS TO KEEP SAFE

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight and in a safe place. Take care when you take them out especially near bus stops and train stations.
- Stay alert and remember earphones/headphones can distract you from being aware of someone approaching from behind you. Thieves can approach on mopeds, e-scooters and pedal cycles.

STAY SAFE GOING TO AND FROM SCHOOL

We want children to be as safe as possible on the school journey.

- · Stay aware of your surroundings when walking.
- Try not to walk along with your phone or valuables out on show.
- Plan your route and use forms of transport others are using
- Aroid shorkuts in isolated places.
- . Don't confront a third or risk your own solety.

Protect yourself from Mobile Phone theft

Don't leave your phone, iPad, tablet or camera unattended, out of your sight, or left on a table. Thieves can grab a phone from a table in seconds.

Be aware of your surroundings and only use your mobile when it feels safe to.

When you've finished using it, put it away.

Register your property on Immobilise.com for free. Used by all UK Police Forces to reunite owners of stolen property.

LOOK UP LOOK OUT

Fearless

Fearless is the dedicated youth service of the independent charity Crimestoppers. They provide you with the opportunity to give information about crime 100% anonymously.

You can give information to them by using their online form (https://crimestoppers-uk.org/fearless/what-is-fearless/whowe-are) or by calling Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111

They cannot track your IP address or your phone number. They have no way of knowing who has contacted them.

After receiving your completed form or your call, they will create a report, ensuring it doesn't contain any information that could identify you, and generate a report which is then sent on to the relevant authority with the legal responsibility to review the information that has been passed to them.

We are not the police. We are a charity. You will not be contacted by the police after passing information on to Fearless as the police have no way of knowing who the information has come from.

STREET ROBBERY

IF YOU SEE **A ROBBERY** TAKING PLACE...

Thieves may use force or threatening behaviour. It's better to hand items over than risk your own safety. If you see a robbery or one has just taken place call police on 999. You can still report later on 101 or online.



SOMETHING ABOUT STREET ROBBERY?

If you have any rmation about street robbery taking place in your area, you can tell us what you know 100% anonymously at Fearless.org

IF YOU ARE A VICTIM

Crime prevention advice can help reduce your chances of being robbed, but it may still en to you. It can be a tening experience and afterwards, esp felt threatened or viol was used. Talking to a parent or adult you trust can help

THIEVES MAY TRY TO USE FORCE OR THREATENING **BEHAVIOUR AND MAY USE MOPEDS OR BICYCLES TO GET AWAY FAST.** DON'T CONFRONT A THIEF OR RISK YOUR OWN PERSONAL SAFETY. If you see a robbery taking place, or have just been robbed, call 999 immediately.
